SUCCESS AND FAILURE IN HOCKEY

Success and failure are as much a part of any hockey game or any hockey season as sticks and pucks. A noted doctor once said, "In the long run, organized hockey helps to teach a child how to attain success (hopefully in a fair way) and also how to cope with failure and loss—the aims of all education and worthwhile discipline."

In hockey, every player wants to be a winner, to be *successful*. It doesn't make sense to enter a game with the goal of *losing*. Defeats in life come easily enough without delibaretely seeking them out. To have any meaning at all, sports must be based upon the *honest attempt to win*. The players on a winning team wear happy faces. The players on the losing side are sad.

No matter what the outcome of a game, kids should be confident that they've done their level best—that's what really counts.

Too often, coaches and parents place far too much emphasis on winning. They may not admit it, but they've adopted the slogan of a famous football coach, Vince Lombardi, who often said, "Winning isn't everything... it's the only thing." Well, it may be the "only thing" for professional players, but the motto does not apply to young players who are just beginning to learn about themselves.

Minor hockey is no place to impose ruthless adult goals like "Win at all costs". The resulting pressure on the youngster playing the game, the fear of failure, can lead to dangerous consequences.

Hockey is a game of fun but the fun soon goes out of the game when a player feels the constant pressure to win. If he misses a goal, if he's part of a losing team, he feels that parents and coaches are branding him FAILURE. That's when he may decide that stamp collecting is a more satisfying pastime.

All kids can easily identify with the hapless Charlie Brown of Peanuts cartoon fame. There he is... all alone on the pitching mound. The bases are loaded in the last inning of a championship game. Realizing the awful gravity of the position he's in, Charlie can only mutter: "My stomach hurts."
